TOBY BARNARD is now an emeritus fellow of Hertford College, Oxford. His publications include *Making the Grand Figure: lives and possessions in Ireland*, *1641-1770* (Yale University Press, 2004). With Alison FitzGerald, he has co-edited *Speculative Minds in Georgian Ireland: novelty, experiment and wider horizons*, which will be published in 2023.

SILVIA BELTRAMETTI is a lecturer in the Department of Art History, Theory and Criticism at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago. Her research focuses on art law as well as international antitrust and intellectual property. She has published in the *Journal of Law and Economics*; *Vanderbilt Journal of Transnational Law*; *Columbia Journal of Law and the Arts*; and *Northwestern Journal of Technology & Intellectual Property*.
